#### Introduction

Another common referencing style that uses the author-date scheme for in-text citations is Harvard. In-text citations only include the author names and the date of publication. The publication's other details are provided at the conclusion. There are two parts in referencing:

- In-text citation
- Reference list entry

#### **Definition**

**Referencing**: is a standardized reference list which aims to acknowledge the books, journal articles, and other different sources of knowledge that you simply use when writing a paper.

**Citation:** providing readers with source information that you have cited for your work. In addition, it gives necessary information to help readers find these sources.

## **Purpose**

When writing an article or a research project, to support your arguments, you should reference a number of different sources, thus requiring to show where the ideas and quotations come from.

- To provide evidence that your research bases on a substantial background;
- To help readers able to find relevant literature about the topic;
- To help authors avoid plagiarism.

#### 1. In-text citation explanation

#### > Direct quote

Exactly copy the words, sentences, and paragraphs.

- **30 words or less:** Quote marks should be used to surround short and direct quotations. These can be single or double quotation marks, but make sure they're all the same. Remember to provide other information regarding to the quote like: the author's name, Year of publication, and the page number.

#### **Example:**

According to (Otung, 2021, p 20), "optical fiber has numerous advantages over radio and copper lines as a transmission medium".

- More than 30 words: Start with an independent block of text without quotation marks and indented from the left edge.

Words can be in a smaller font size.

Example:

Distance education is a new trend in education that has benefited from developing information technology and tries to make the best use of new technologies for different geographical locations. That is why cloud computing is an attractive environment for students, teachers, and researchers (Al-Malah et al, 2021, p 4).

#### Paraphrasing

Paraphrasing is rewriting someone else's ideas by writers' own words. Remember to keep the content original meaning and cite the source information properly.

#### Example:

According to Machi and McEvoy (2016), a literature review is a written document that presents a logically argued case founded on a comprehensive understanding of the current state of knowledge about a topic of study.

Paraphrasing: A literature review is a document that provides a reasonably argued argument based on background of the existing information on a particular subject (Machi & McEvoy 2016).

#### Authors citing other authors (secondary source)

Cite the original author when a secondary source discusses a certain topic and writer repeats the study's findings or arguments without consulting the primary source.

- Use the author-date citation system from the original source (author, Year publication and add "as cited in (Author and publication Year of the secondary source)".
- The reference list includes only the secondary source.

### > Citing sources if page numbers are unavailable

You can utilize major sections, chapters, paragraphs (para.) or headings for direct quotes from such sources without pagination:

#### **Examples:**

"The energy invested in building materials and construction is significant" (Kibert 2016, para. 4).

### 2. Author variations

#### No author

If no personal author is given and you are sure that your source is credible, follow the guidelines below:

Replace the author by the article title in both the citation and reference list, abbreviate the work's title if it's too long in the in-text citation.
